

- **Distinctive Work:** an artistic performance, exhibition, film, television show, play, composition, or practical contribution to arts policy - cash prize of **\$3,500** sponsored by Routledge
- **Future Leader:** an individual demonstrating leadership skills and potential in the humanities, arts, and social sciences - cash prize of **\$2,000** sponsored by Future Leaders
- **Student:** an essay, project or thesis in any humanities, arts, or social sciences area - **\$500 voucher** sponsored by Co-Op

From our affiliates: Australasian Digital Humanities Conference DH2016

Digital humanities researchers, GLAM (galleries, libraries, archives and museums) and eResearch professionals will meet in Hobart from 20 to 23 June at the 2016 biennial Australasian Digital Humanities Conference (DHA2016).

The theme of DHA2016 is working with complexity. Using digital technologies to understand our creativity, cultures and society presents numerous technical challenges, but arguably more significant are the intellectual and conceptual complexities that realising their creative and analytical potential presents. The conference program richly reflects the multifaceted nature of digital humanities research. Participants will explore various aspects of theory and practice, the challenges of creating and sharing research data, and innovations in tools and services in this new and still highly experimental interdisciplinary field. A particular focus of the conference will be assessing the needs of digital humanities researchers in terms of data management and research infrastructure.

The conference will also run in collaboration with the [Digital Panopticon](#): Penal History in a Digital Age Conference, which will be held in Hobart from 22-24 June 2016.

Abstract and paper submission deadline extended to 17 June

Delegates can be listed as a sole or lead author on one presentation only and may be listed as a co-author on one additional paper. All abstracts and papers will be submitted for a review process with notification of results sent via email by early August 2016. Accepted abstracts and papers will be allocated 15 minutes presentation time and 5 minutes for questions. Please note that all presenters must be registered by October 16 to be included in the conference programme.

Scholarships for Australians

Fulbright Distinguished Chair in Agriculture & Life Sciences

Sponsored by Kansas State University
For senior level academics to work with Kansas State University faculty in priority research areas leading to ongoing collaborative partnerships between the U.S. and Australia. This Scholarship supports a 5-6 month program, and includes a series of public lectures.

Fulbright Senior Scholarships

For Australian academics (generally at associate professor or professor level) to undertake research at a U.S. institution. This Scholarship supports a 3-4 month program.

Fulbright Professional Scholarships

For aspiring Australian mid-career professionals in the private, public and not-for-profit sectors to undertake training or research programs in the U.S. The Scholarship is also open to academics whose research focus is professional or industry based. This Scholarship supports a 3-4 month program.

Fulbright Postdoctoral Scholarships
