

Nominations for the 2018 CHASS Australia Prizes in the Humanities, Arts and Social Sciences (HASS) will close next week on Monday, 2 July. If you haven't already applied, please do so by 5PM AEST on the day. To be fair to all applicants, incomplete or late submissions will not be accepted. There is no nomination fee for any category and self-nominations are welcome. Terms and conditions apply. Please <u>read the guidelines for each category</u> carefully before submitting. All nominated works must be in English and relevant to Australian cultural and intellectual life. Please share this information with your networks and encourage colleagues and friends to nominate. Don't miss out, apply now!

Social Sciences Week Australia 2018: We are collaborating with The Australian Sociological Association (TASA), the Australian and New Zealand Society of Criminology (ANZSOC), the Australian Anthropology Society (AAS), the Australian Political Studies Association (APSA), The Academy of the Social Sciences in Australia (ASSA) and The Australasian Council of Deans of Arts, Social Sciences and Humanities (DASSH) to organise Australia's first national Social Sciences Week in September 2018. This week-long series of events is an opportunity for social scientists to engage non-academic audiences with cutting-edge social science research and showcase the diversity and relevance of social science. It will include interactive community and school-based events that will bring the social sciences to life, particularly for the next generation of university students, social scientists and citizens. Events held during the Social Sciences Week can be staged by any individual or group attached to an organisation that has the capacity to run an event, including Social Sciences associations, universities, schools, community organisations or businesses. The Council for the Humanities, Arts and Social Sciences (CHASS) is inviting nominations for its 2018 Australia Prizes. The CHASS Australia Prizes honour distinguished achievements by Australians working, studying or training in the Humanities, Arts and Social Sciences (HASS).

Nominations close 5pm AEST on 2 July 2018





CHASS Australia Prize for a Book (Cash Prize of \$3,500)

For a non-fiction book that contributes most to Australian culture and intellectual life



CHASS Australia Prize for a Distinctive Work (Cash Prize of \$3,500)

For a performance, exhibition, project or specific advancement in policy development in any HASS field



CHASS Australia Prize for a Future Leader (Cash Prize of \$2,000)

For a Future Leader in any aspect of the Humanities, Arts & Social Sciences Nominees must not have reached 30 years of age before 31 December 2017



CHASS Australia Prize for a Student (Cash Prize of \$500)

For a student project, performance or exhibition that best exemplifies the contribution of HASS areas to our understanding of ourselves and our nation





Nominees in this category must have published a non-fiction book/e-book in any HASS area between 1 January and 31 December 2017. The prize will be awarded to the author whose book, in the opinion of the judges, contributes most to cultural and intellectual life in Australia. Books should be by a single author or, at most, two authors. Edited collections are not eligible. T&Cs apply.



This prize is for an artistic project, performance, exhibition, film, play, composition, HASS research project, or contribution to HASS policy. Performances/exhibitions must have

been open to the public between 1 January and 31 December 2017. Policy work/research may have commenced earlier, but must have been completed during 2017. T&Cs apply.



This prize is for an early career professional in any of the HASS disciplines. It recognises the nominee's professional achievements and contribution to the advancement of the HASS sector, and celebrates best practice and innovation of young HASS professionals in Australia. To be eligible, nominees must be 30 years or under as at 31 December 2017. T&Cs apply.



This prize is for a student essay, project, performance or exhibition that best exemplifies the contribution of HASS to our understanding of our nation and us. Students enrolled at any level in any Australian tertiary educational institution are eligible. The nominated work must have been completed between 1 January and 31 December 2017. Honours/post-graduate/doctoral theses are not eligible. T&Cs apply.


CHASS Book - Humanities, Arts and Social Sciences *It's everyone's business*
